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
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Freedom or Death: The Theory and Practice of Mikhail Bakunin

Felipe Corrêa


Freedom or Death is a groundbreaking interdisciplinary study of the life and work of the Russian revolutionary and titan in the history of anarchism Mikhail Aleksandrovitch Bakunin (1814–76). Brazilian scholar Felipe Corrêa offers in-depth analysis of Bakunin's political theory produced between 1836 and 1876, anchoring it in his political-intellectual trajectory. The book is a history of Bakunin's political thought that encompasses all of his writings, his most important letters, and dialogue with his principal interlocutors, as well as synthesizing all previous scholarship. Corrêa provides valuable historical context to fully understand the development and ultimate coherence of Bakunin's radical thought.

Corrêa analyzes Bakunin's landmark contributions to the shaping of anarchism (and of revolutionary syndicalism) and his considerable influence. Bakunin's theory and practice continues to hold great power for the global Left today, as anarchism offers a means of liberation from tyranny that has never been more urgent.

Felipe Corrêa is a professor of Social Sciences and Research at Mackenzie Presbyterian University, Brazil, and co-founder of the Institute for Anarchist Theory and History (ITHA-IATH).

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
Eros and Revolution

Tying his intellectual concerns to social movements in South Korea, Germany, and dozens of other countries, social theorist George Katsiaficas traces the evolution of history from the global eruption of 1968 and the Black Panther Party to the 1980 Gwangju Uprising and Occupy Wall Street. His theory of the Eros effect helps us to understand social movements as a logical unfolding of the practice of people rising up to change their lives. This book gives many examples, both historic and contemporary, of general strikes, insurrections, and revolutions from around the world, constituting the concrete realization of freedom in history. The material included in this work inspires hope—hope to live more freely and cooperatively—and motivates us to take risks and be daring because bold ideas can lead to fundamental social change.

George Katsiaficas is a social theorist known for his many writings on social movements, including *The Imagination of the New Left: A Global Analysis of 1968* and *The Subversion of Politics: European Autonomous Social Movements and the Decolonization of Everyday Life.*

The life and politics of Martin Heidegger raise a serious question: How was one of the most important philosophers of the twentieth century willing to ally himself with Nazism and what does this mean for philosophy? Because the influence of Heidegger's thought continues to spread, we must confront him at the core of his philosophy, using the concepts of autonomy, temporality, and freedom. The most important philosophical challenge to Heideggerian thought has been expressed by Cornelius Castoriadis. This vital new study outlines the Castoriadian philosophy of time in contrast to the Heideggerian and highlights the main points of their opposition. It deals with both philosophers' concepts and arguments around human existence, the individual, society, and temporality, extending to consider transformative contemporary phenomena like space exploration, cyberspace, and online communications. The book revives the public debate around philosophy and politics, illuminating the importance of critical philosophical and political thinking.

Alexandros Schismenos holds a PhD in Philosophy from the University of Ioannina and is currently a post-doctoral researcher at the Aristotelian University of Thessaloniki. He co-authored *Common Futures: Social Transformation and Political Ecology.*

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
Subverting Politics: Autonomous Social Movements Today

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Kropotkin Now! Life, Freedom & Ethics

Prince Peter Kropotkin (1842–1921) was one of the great thinkers of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. As a Russian anarchist, philosopher, economist, historian, geographer, and scientist, Kropotkin's critical thought on issues such as mutual aid and anarchism have become tenets of multiple current social movements. As the foundations of neoliberalism shake and neo-fascist movements spawn around the world, the practice of mutual aid, the theories of anarchism and participatory democracy, and critique of social Darwinism have seldom been as important as they are today. Many activists and scholars are using Kropotkin's ideas to challenge these authoritarian threats and to work toward an egalitarian future. *Kropotkin Now!* is the culmination of an international conference focused on investigating Kropotkin's ideas and on imagining new alternatives on the centenary of his death. Contributors engage Kropotkin's work in diverse contexts, including evolution and mutual aid, cyborgs and feminist technoscience, Kropotkin's treatment of "the sex question," urbanization, building dual power, and more.
